Hence, I would like to thank the Parish Pastoral Councils and all the volunteers no matter how great or small your impact for the betterment of our parish, your second home. It is and will always be appreciated and held in high esteem.

May our celebration of Christmas be a time to seek and find growth in our faith and trust in our saviour Jesus Christ. I humbly pray to the Lord that the spirit of generosity will always be at present and at work all the days of our life, not just during this festive season. During 2019 we have continued with our parish priorities of Community, Education and Formation, Parish and School and Our Buildings and Surrounds.

Our Community Celebration this year was held on the 24 March. It was well supported. We also celebrated Christmas early at our recent "Y" Mass. The Holy Week ceremonies between the three parishes were a huge workload for Father Novie. All ceremonies were meaningful including the Combined Churches of Kerang Stations of the Cross ceremony held in the main street

In June 2018 we were advised of the upcoming Plenary Council which was to be conducted in Australia with our requirement to have a dialogue with our parishioners about the future of the Church, and what God is asking of us in Australia. Father Novie, Christine O' Donoghue and myself attended an information day in Bendigo. Resources became available with a survey. A group session was held in February after the surveys were collated and themes identified. Father Novie submitted St Patrick's answers to the diocesan pool. As a result of discussion, and Father Novie's enthusiasm we have commenced our "Y" Masses, and to date three Masses have been conducted in St Joseph's hall with increased interest from parents and parishioners.

The Grief Support Group continues to meet, and the Bereavement team continues to assist in the preparation of funerals, and both groups are highly valued within our parish community. Thank you to those who carry out this work. We farewelled former principal Nick Hall and his family and welcomed Chris Mitchell and his family into our parish. Commentary commenced at the beginning of Mass and is working well. Our Acknowledgement to Country was developed and is at the top of the front page of the bulletin each week.

The Master Plan for Maintenance and Capital Development has continued.

This year we have had the new toilet facility come to fruition and it is now in use. The confessional has had the glass panel installed, the broken window at the front of the church repaired the entrance doors adjusted and rehinged, and the piety stall moved to make way for the new toilet. The seats have been rearranged to allow for wider aisles and to fit in with the new entrance as a result of the new toilet. A Defibrillator has been donated and installed in the church and some parishioners have undertaken training in the use of it should it be required. Our communal area used for the cuppa after Mass is working well with increased numbers attending each month.

The Memorial Garden continues to be developed with an Exmouth magnolia tree planted to fill in the vacant area. A new crib for outside the church was purchased and installed from money raised by the ladies who cater for the funerals. It serves to remind us all of the true meaning of Christmas. The parish has also decorated a rustic tree to bring a Christmas message to all, and it is to be placed in the Autopro shop window in Kerang.

Parish members continue to take turns to mow the lawns, and along with our working bees which were held in June and November, the grounds are being well maintained. Our most recent working bee concentrated on interior cleaning of the church after the builders had completed their work. A constitution has been developed for the Parish Pastoral Council and this has been submitted to the bishop for endorsement.

Thank you to Father Novie for the dedication and enthusiasm you bring to your work. We are indeed grateful that you are among us. My sincere thanks to all parishioners for all that you do to make this parish function so well, and to my fellow Parish Council members for your support and encouragement during the year. May you all enjoy a blessed and happy Christmas season.
